Social work intervention

For the period April 2010 to March 2011, 51 women and 53 children were assisted by St Anne's Homes. The shelter focuses specifically on mothers and their children who have experienced some form of abuse or rejection from their families; is poverty-stricken; crisis pregnancies; abandoned by their partners/spouse and is often unemployed. These factors can be closely linked to them becoming destitute. Some women have a history of welfare dependency; is solely dependent on their partners/spouses for finances; while others grew up as foster children or have been institutionalised from a young age. They often also have little or no education and have never been employed in all of their lives. They have distorted views of what family life is about as some have never experienced that lifestyle. They often also experience abuse and rejection from their families.

Women who came into this shelter presented with the following circumstances:

- **six** foreigners were assisted within this period
- **one** woman gave her baby up for adoption
- **eight** women and their children benefited from the second stage accommodation
- **one** woman with **two** premature babies. The loss of one of them were felt by all the women within the shelter
- **four** women were pregnant
- **three**, to our knowledge, disclosed that they were HIV positive
- **seven** of the women were destitute
- **ten** of the women experienced abuse or domestic violence

Counselling and case work

We offer counselling to these women in a very unique way. It allows them to take ownership of their lives and therefore it is based on a developmental and empowerment process. We often begin where the women are at. All the women receive counselling in the following areas: drug counselling, parenting skills, support and finding employment support. Some women were referred to Narcotics Anonymous (NA), Trauma Centre, Cape Town Drug Counselling Centre, Famsa and other organisations to assist with specialised intervention services. We have also

made use of international social work interns and a SACAP student which assist with counselling for identified women.

Based on this St Anne's Homes empowerment programme consists of the following workshops:

- job-readiness programme
- self development (self esteem)
- computer skills
- parenting skills
- HIV/aids
- therapeutic group counselling(domestic violence)
- sewing workshop
- jewellery making
- cooking and baking

Sixty percent of the women found employment during this period. This means that 30 women were employed.

During the past year we found that there is a prevalence of substance abuse among women who have been abused. We realise that this is a coping mechanism, but unfortunately the necessary tools and skills to assist them with the dependency is minimal. It is often sad when these women fall through the cracks because of this.



Children's programmes

April 2010 to March 2011

For the year April 2010 to March 2011, seventy-two children have benefited from the early childhood development programs namely the educational and therapeutic. Twenty-seven babies, thirty-three toddlers and twelve preschoolers benefited from the above mentioned programmes.

Educational programme

Toddlers and Preschooler went through the educational program which is curriculum based. It is designed to equip the children with the knowledge and skills focusing on basic elementary teachings on literacy, numeracy and life skills. Individual developmental assessment is done on each child and referrals for various interventions are then recommended.

Therapy programme

This programme continues to develop steadily. The work includes nurturing existing partnerships eg SACAP, cultivating new connections and embracing therapy as an integral component of the package available to children and women associated with St Anne's Homes.

Play therapy

Individual play therapy sessions are conducted by our play therapist Elaine Roodt. Before any counseling takes place the mother of the child is consulted and with her permission the play therapy sessions resume. Five children have benefited from the play therapy sessions so far.

Music therapy

Our sincere thanks goes to Kerryn Torrance (the director) and the Music Therapy Community Clinic for nominating us as one of their mentor sites and also for the skills imparted to the child carers. Three crèche staff members were trained on creative music facilitation and since then every Thursdays there is a session on music therapy facilitated by child carers. It is at such sessions that children are themselves, their feelings validated and the carers work at the children's pace.

Mother-child workshops

We believe that the bond between the mother and the child is sacred and should therefore be preserved. It is the key to growth and development of the child. Sweetness does the observation in the baby class and gives mothers individual feedback. This would range from issues such as hygiene, illness, and methods of feeding and the milestones of the child. The process is on going and gives the mother the opportunity to grow as a parent.

Social workers and social educators

Six preschoolers benefited from group work conducted by the social work interns from USA and Social Educators from Denmark. The topics of discussions ranged from discipline issues, family and place of home, painting and art work. This was very beneficial in the sense that children developed a sense of sharing and working together in small groups. Their social and communication skills also got better.



To the management committee

St Anne's Homes and place of safety

We have audited the annual financial statements of St Anne's Homes and place of safety set out on pages 11 to 19 for the year ended 31 March 2011. These financial statements are the responsibility of the management board, while our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audit.

We conducted our audit in accordance with statements of International Auditing Standards which require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance that the financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used, as well as evaluating the overall financial statement presentation. We believe that our audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinion.

Qualification

The organisation allocates costs between donors and projects on the basis set out in note 1.4 to the annual financial statements. We have relied on management's allocations for the purposes of our audit.

Audit opinion

Except for the effects of the above, in our opinion, the financial statements fairly present, in all material respects, the financial position of the organisation at 31 March 2011 and the results of its operations for the year then ended in accordance with South African Statements of generally accepted accounting practice.

Notes to the financial statements for the year ended 31 March 2011

1. Accounting Policies

The financial statements are prepared on the historical cost basis and incorporate the following principal accounting policies which are consistent, in all material respects, with those of the previous year:

1.1 Fixed Assets

Income is generally brought to account in the period to which it relates.

Accordingly, accrued grant income which is income designated for the current year but received subsequent to the financial year end, is included in income and accounted for as a current asset.

1.2 Depreciation

Equipment is stated at cost less depreciation. Depreciation is calculated using the reducing balance method at rates which will write off the cost of equipment over expected useful lives as follows :-

Computer equipment	33.33%	pa
Sewing equipment	25%	pa
Office furniture	10%	pa
Furniture and fittings	16.67%	pa
Motor vehicles	20%	pa

1.3 Equipment fund

In order that operating reserves reflect assets available to fund the operations of the organisation, an equipment fund is maintained to separate out the funding of such assets. The equipment fund is maintained at a value equal to the carrying value of such assets in the balance sheet. This is achieved by the transfer of an amount equal to the cost of equipment acquired during the year, from the operating fund to the equipment fund. Depreciation, calculated as stated in note 1.2 is charged against the fund.

1.4 Allocation of project costs

Management allocates expenses against specific donor funds or projects on the basis of budgets agreed to by donors and management's assessment as to which projects have incurred the expenses concerned.

Sanna Hartnick's story

I've been at St Anne's Homes almost two years. I came here when my daughter, Nicky when she was 14 days old. I lived on the street for nine years. It was a nightmare but my partner, Johan, was always with me. He looked after me.

Then I fell pregnant. I only stopped drinking when I was five and a half months. It was winter and I didn't care – you drink to forget your problems. When I gave birth, they wouldn't let me go because Nicky was underweight. After two weeks, her father came to fetch me on the Friday and we were back sleeping outside with my newborn, covered with plastic. On the Monday we went to the MES Church in Bellville and they phoned St Anne's Homes. Since that day, I've been living here.

When I came here, I was scared. I told myself it was not for me – it was too far from Nicky's father. But coming here saved my life; it saved my baby's life. When I was pregnant, the law enforcement people told me 'when you give birth we will take your child away' and that made me scared. Then her father found a small room for himself. I thank God because He helped us both.

The staff helped me through everything. I didn't know how to change or wash a baby. Sometimes I feel guilty when I see how small Nicky is, because I was using alcohol. But people here say I must stop blaming myself. I must start a new life.

I got a full-time job as a domestic worker when Nicky was four months old. She goes to the crèche at St Anne's Homes and she is happy.

Now my time is up at St Anne's Homes and they are trying to help me find a place to stay.

Leigh-Ann (29) and Danyal Philander (4): their story

In August 2010, I came to St Anne's Homes first stage. Coming here pulled me out of an abusive relationship with my ex-husband and mother-in-law. My son, Danyal, witnessed everything. I didn't have a job and I didn't have anywhere to go. Since my marriage I hadn't spoken to my parents, because they were completely against it. In those five years, I started believing the horrible things my ex and his mother said about me.

I see the scars that have been caused to Danyal – he would scream with fear if I left his sight. Now he's got to the stage where, as long as he knows where I am, he's happy. She would also lock him up in the bathroom and switch the lights off to punish him, so he is petrified of the dark.

When we came to St Anne's Homes, the play therapist said he had an obsession – he did everything over-the-top and he was very aggressive. He would swear at the teachers and bite the other children and he cried a lot. He spoke like a baby and he couldn't count or say the alphabet. With play and music therapy, he has improved. .

Slowly but surely all the programmes at St Anne's Homes have helped me become more sure of myself. I take responsibility for the bad decisions I made, but I realise that I didn't deserve to be abused. Being able to support myself and have my own money means a lot to me. I work at the canteen at the Western Grand Hotel and also train in guest relations. I am in contact with my parents and my daughter who lives with them. They'll meet Danyal for the first time in February next year. Danyal is so excited about meeting his sister!.
